## Family Spotlight



This month the spotlight shines on the Reverend Jerius Lamont Marshall. Jerius was born in Shreveport LA to Inez Davis Marshall and the late Percy V. Marshall. He is the oldest of three (3) children, and was baptized at the tender age of 10 years old. At a very early age he dedicated his life to serving God. Growing up in the Morning Star Missionary Baptist Church, he actively participated in the Children's Ministry and Youth Ministry. He served as

assistant to Pastor Murphy L. Hunt and served as the Youth Pastor for many years. Jerius has attended and been very active in the 13th District Missionary Baptist Association of Shreveport, where he earned many credits in Christian Education. In the Louisiana Baptist State Convention, he has attended and earned certificates in the Pastor's Alternative Classes. In the National Baptist Convention, USA, he continued in the Pastor's Alternative Classes. Jerius was educated in the Caddo Parish School System and attended Louisiana Baptist University and Bossier Community College. Jerius L. Marshall accepted and confessed his call to the ministry in May of 1996, and in September of that same year, he preached his 1st sermon.

Your Family Health Heritage Submitted by: GJM Family History Team

Do you know your family health heritage-the risks that have been handed down to you? If your doctor asked for your family's health history, would you be able to give it?

Sankofa is an Akan word that means, "We must go back and reclaim our past so we can move forward; so we understand why and how we came to be who we are today." You may know that you got your thin hair from your grandmother and your dimples from your dad. These aren't the only things you may have inherited from your family. Many medical conditions, including heart disease, breast cancer, prostate cancer, diabetes, alcoholism

and Alzheimer's disease have also been shown to be passed down through families.

Family Health Heritage is a record of our ancestors and relatives. It is a legacy for our children.

Many of the factors that determine our health (or illnesses) were inherited from our ancestors. Creating a family health heritage history can be beneficial in providing an assessment of our medical history.

Researching and documenting family health heritage can also assist in interpreting patterns of health, illness and genetic traits of our ancestors.

Understanding our risk for developing diseases is an important reason to learn more about family health history. By knowing our risk factors, we can make informed decisions about prevention. One of our hopes is that our family reunions and our health fairs will not only encourage our family to build mutually beneficial family histories but also that family members will recognize the value of maintaining and controlling their own medical records.
